

Silver Spring Neighborhood Center is located in Westlawn - Wisconsin's largest public housing development - and serves more than 8,000 individuals each year. Silver Spring fulfills its mission to **build a safer, stronger neighborhood and community** by helping individuals and families work towards self-sufficiency.

Using a holistic approach, we guide our participants to self-sufficiency. We offer ten core programs - ranging from prenatal care coordination to child development and from youth and teen programs to adult and senior programs.

#### JAYLA'S CHALLENGE

Jayla attends our Elaine Schreiber Child Development Center and is advanced for her age. Jayla reads numbers, letters and articulates well. Despite being intellectually advanced, Jayla faced social and emotional challenges like adapting to classroom routines and engaging with peers.

#### SILVER SPRING IN ACTION

With Jayla's parents and teacher united, a behavior-changing strategy was formed using behavior models and techniques that build upon Jayla's strengths. This effective at-home and in-classroom strategy helped her adjust.

#### **JAYLA'S RESULTS**

Today, Jayla knows how to articulate her needs in age-appropriate ways. As a result, her teachers and parents know how to meet her developmental needs.

#### LAVONTE'S CHALLENGE

After an abusive childhood, Lavonte ended up in foster care at age 16 and struggled to finish school. At 19, Lavonte was without a home.

#### SILVER SPRING IN ACTION

Lavonte started working with a caseworker to get into housing and a job. Without work experience, Lavonte doubted he'd have much of a future. But, through SSNC, he received a job as a Youth Coordinator and will soon begin training through the Job Corps program.

#### LAVONTE'S RESULTS

Once reserved, Lavonte is quick to smile today. He's learning the value of personal responsibility and a good work ethic. He likes being a part of the community and helping others.

# Meet Chaz

#### **CHAZ'S CHALLENGE**

The son of a single parent who struggled with drug and alcohol addiction while living in public housing, Chaz was exposed to violence and dysfunction very early. He often modeled that same behavior.

#### SILVER SPRING IN ACTION

The staff at the Silver Spring Neighborhood Center never gave up on trying to help Chaz. In fact, The center's former executive director, Anthony McHenry challenged Chaz to stay out of trouble in order to try out for center's Spartans basketball team.

#### **CHAZ'S RESULTS**

Without Silver Spring, Chaz believes he would've died violently or been incarcerated. Instead, Chaz graduated high school and college. Today, Chaz is married, a father, and the owner of a real estate company.
